When the apostle Paul was locked up in Rome, he wrote a letter to Timothy from prison. He does not plead that the saints intercede for his release. Instead, intimacy with both Jesus and the Scriptures fill him with confidence, even in the loss of his personal freedom.

"The Word of God is not bound!" he declares in 2 Timothy 2:9.

This year, 30 Days of Prayer for the Muslim World tells the stories of Muslims who have been impacted by the Christian scriptures. Many of the stories are testimonies of those who have had a personal encounter with Jesus in their reading of the Bible and trusted Him for salvation. Others are still considering His claims. The stories will show that the Word of God is not bound to specific geographical locations. It is not bound to a specific format; the Word of God leaps from pages, speaks through mobile phones and audio players, declares itself boldly on social media, is glimpsed in art and even appears as Jesus Himself.

Each story is set in the context of a specific Muslim community that needs your prayers. We trust that this prayer guide will inspire you to pray throughout these 30 days that Muslims will encounter the Jesus of Scripture, the spiritual power of the gospel (Rom. 1:16), and the effective work of the Word of God (Heb. 4:12).

MUSLIMS and the CHRISTIAN SCRIPTURES

Christians are often surprised to learn of the importance of Jesus in Islam. Whereas Judaism rejects Jesus as the Messiah for whom they are still waiting, Muslims consider Jesus to be the most important Prophet in Islam, next to Muhammad.

Muslim objections to Christianity can be summarised in two categories: objections to the living Word of God (Jesus) and objections to the written Word of God (the Bible). While embracing Jesus as a prophet, Muslims reject a trinitarian concept of God as well as the deity of Christ and his sacrificial death on the cross.

In Islam, Scripture is sent by God and is authoritative. Certainly nothing written by humans can be considered divinely inspired. Muslims believe the Torah, the first five books of Moses, descended from God to Moses. They believe the *Zebur*, what we call the Psalms, descended from God to David. And in the same way, they believe that the *Incil*, the Gospels, descended from God to Jesus. Each was a form of progressive revelation which – after becoming corrupted – led to their belief in the final revelation of the *Qur'an* descending to Muhammad.

The *Qur'an* refers to Jews and Christians as 'People of the Book' and Christians should adhere to this noble title by generously sharing our book with Muslims. Despite the internet being rife with questions from Muslims about whether they are allowed to read – or even touch – a Bible, there is great curiosity. There's no need to prepare a 'Bible study' – just invite your Muslim friend to read together. Pray for the eyes of their hearts to be enlightened. And if they want to read the *Qur'an* and Bible side by side, let them feel free. The love of God as revealed in the Bible is its own testimony.

- *Jesus exhorts us to not only love God, but also our neighbour (Matt 22:37-39). The Samaritan became a neighbour to the wounded man on the Jericho road by going out of his way to care for him. We make neighbours of Muslims by reaching out in prayer to pray blessings on them, their families and communities.*
- *We love, because He first loved us (1 John 4:19). Ask God to fill you with His love as you participate in this year's 30 Days of Prayer for the Muslim World.*

DAY 1 • FEBRUARY 28

the **TUAREG** of **WEST AFRICA**

Lee grew up in a typical Tuareg community where, left to mind the family herds and farm, he never had opportunity to attend school. He dreamt of one day learning to read.

One evening as a young man, he finished work in the onion fields and came to the nearest town where he found a gospel worker selling books and tracts. He purchased several books, commenting that he wished he knew how to read them. The worker asked, "You just spent money buying books that you can't read?" Lee replied, "That is my next question. Would you be able to help me learn to read? It has been my dream almost my whole life."

Together they spent months learning to read materials produced in Tamajaq, one of the languages of the Tuareg. They started with words, then sentences and eventually progressed to a book of animal tales. As Lee's reading got stronger, they went on to read the first twelve chapters of Genesis. From Genesis, they went on to read the gospel of Luke.

One evening, Lee said to his friend, "I have something to tell you. I have decided to follow Jesus like you." The worker asked, "Lee, who is Jesus for you?" His response was unforgettable. Lee said, "Do you remember when Abraham was asked to sacrifice his son, Isaac, but at the last minute the angel stopped Abraham and there was a ram in the thicket that took Isaac's place? As we have been reading in this book of Luke, I can see that Jesus is my Ram!"

DAY 2 • MARCH 1

the **TURKS** in the **EARTHQUAKE ZONE**

In February 2023, two strong earthquakes destroyed the biblical city of Antioch, affecting over 9 million people in the region. But God prompted the leaders of one church to remain in the devastation to serve their fellow survivors. While providing food, clothing, tents and other emergency accommodation, they continued to hold services each Sunday that grew to over 100 people.

At one point, God moved the leader's wife to suggest to two Muslim women that they might consider copying the New Testament (NT). They both agreed and were provided with the supplies they needed. Then two people became three, four, five, and now close to 600 Muslims are copying the New Testament!

One young man who had just finished copying had questions and asked what he should do about the sacrifices his family were preparing. He explained he had become a Christian from what he had read, without talking to anyone.

One person wanted to understand the NT better, so having finished, is copying it all out again. Another said, "I am so glad I took a package for my grandchildren. We are really enjoying copying, as a family!" Having finished copying the whole NT, one couple has begun copying the entire Bible. They have come to faith.

One young woman after copying the whole NT was asked what she had understood from what she had copied. She answered, "You know, I used to only like people who liked me. I had no use for anyone who was not interested in me. Now I am trying to love them! I used to be jealous of everyone. But now I'm trying to not be jealous."

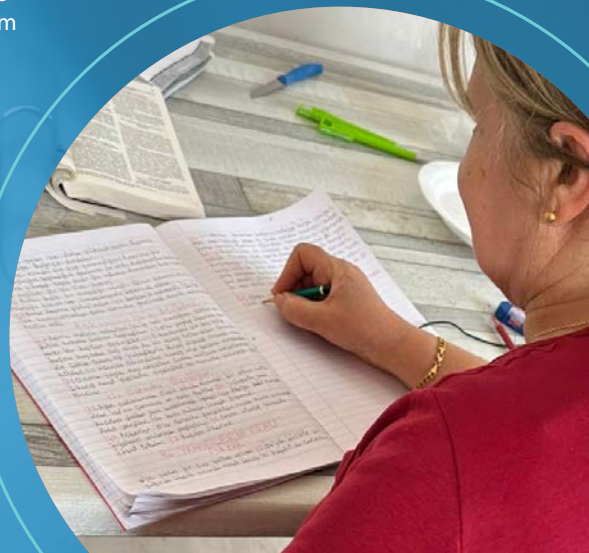

DAY 3 • MARCH 2 the PASHTUNS

Pashtuns (Pukhtuns, Pathans) are a 60+ million tribal group living in Pakistan and Afghanistan, and in the Middle East as contract workers. Pashtuns are warrior-romantics; fierce in defence of their honour, but enjoying music, poetry, and flowers. Linguistic and cultural differences separate the Pashtuns of Pakistan from those of Afghanistan and also distinguish one tribe from another. However, Pashtuns agree that adherence to orthodox Sunni Islam, and strict observance of Pashto religio-cultural codes are common to all. A strong sense of religious purity separates Pashtuns from other religions, including Christianity. Yet there are an un-numbered few who follow Christ in their homelands. Among them are those who are reaching out with the Word of God to their own people.

Believing Pashtuns translate and distribute the Word in print, audio, and video. For this generation, the Bible in Pakistani Pashto was published in 2019, and the New Testament in Afghan Pashto in 2023. Those with a laptop or smartphone can access the Scriptures in four major dialects of Pashto through Pashtozera.org, afghanbibles.org and the Prophets Stories App. The Pashtun love of poetry makes the Psalms and Proverbs especially popular.

As religious extremism prevents most believers from meeting in person, connection online for a Discovery Bible Study is an important way by which Pashtuns can interact with God's Word. Recently, several believers met online to talk about charity, fasting and prayer—the traditional means of earning treasure in heaven. On hearing what the Bible teaches, one man responded, *"Our hearts have been enlightened by hearing God's word! We believe in this holy Word."*

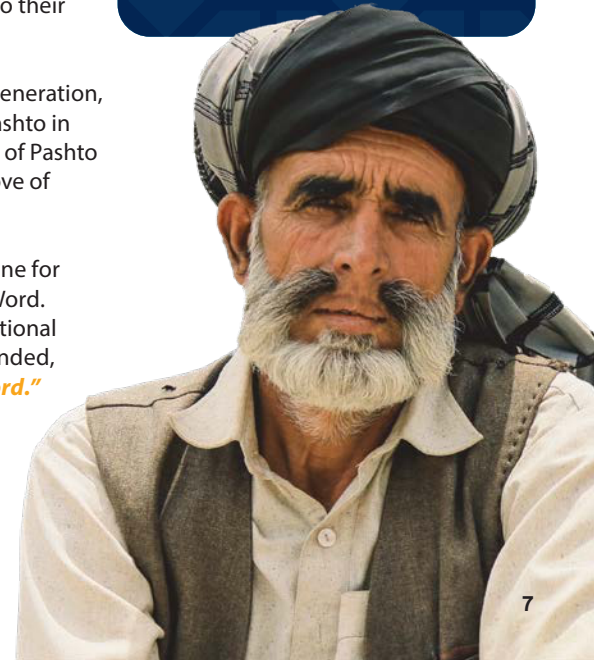

DAY 4 • MARCH 3

the **KAZAKHS** from **CHINA**

Tolkyn grew up in a big city in eastern China, though his people consider the northwest of the country to be their home area. Despite not being especially religious or traditional, he considers himself a Muslim. Like many younger-generation Kazakhs, he's living abroad. Work, study, family connections, and immigration are common reasons for this phenomenon.

Kazakhs who travel out of China tend to be ambitious and prize worldly wisdom. Having escaped many limitations by coming out of their country, they recognize the relative freedom they're enjoying. At least some of their dreams are coming true, though their happiness is often mixed with heartache over separation from relatives still in China.

Tolkyn is pursuing advanced studies and thinking seriously about marriage to his girlfriend, Saule. Through Saule, he met some Jesus-followers in the city where he lives. He had read some of John's gospel in Chinese years ago, but it didn't make much of an impression on him. Saule's friends, however, in a conversation about how a husband and wife relate to each other in marriage, brought up the passage in Ephesians 5 where it says, "Husbands, love your wives..." This really made Tolkyn think. The fact that this scripture was in Kazakh, and not some other language, also got his attention— so much so that he got a copy of the Bible in Kazakh for himself.

HOW CAN WE **PRAY?**

- *For Kazakhs living abroad to feel a longing to know their Creator that nothing else (education, career, money, emigration, even family) can satisfy.*
- *For them to meet Jesus-followers along their paths in pursuit of worldly ambitions.*
- *That Kazakhs would have the opportunity and desire to read scripture, and that they would receive understanding through the Holy Spirit.*

DAY 5 • MARCH 4
ZANZIBAR

Fantastic beaches, picturesque sunsets and a natural paradise attract thousands upon thousands of tourists to the popular island archipelago of Zanzibar every year. They make a stark contrast to the local Zanzibaris, who are 99 % Muslim. Deeply entangled in folk Islam and occultism, they try to distance themselves from the influence of the Western world through their religion and traditions. Jesus speaks into this bondage and conflict and calls Zanzibaris to follow Him.

Mansour experienced that through Isa al-Masih (Jesus, the Messiah) he was set free from evil spirits and demonic burdens. Curious, he and his family watched LUMO films about the life of Jesus, and they began reading the Injil (New Testament). They decided to follow Jesus into a life of light and freedom. Mansour's father-in-law in the south of the island heard that his daughter had been set free by Jesus - something that all magicians had failed to do so far. A group of seekers are now meeting there, too, to learn more about Jesus in the Injil. The first life changes through the Holy Spirit can be seen, and some are ready to be baptised.



HOW CAN WE **PRAY?**

- *That the young believers would take courageous steps of obedience and not allow themselves to be prevented from doing so by rumours circulating about baptism.*
- *That Jesus would answer their prayers when they pray in His name for the sick and burdened.*
- *For supernatural protection and care for the believers, who are now increasingly disadvantaged and persecuted by religious leaders and neighbours.*

DAY 6 • MARCH 5

ALBANIA



Hamit was born into an Albanian Muslim family. He thought that by fasting and doing good deeds he could find salvation, but these were things he practiced only out of obligation to his parents. He felt nothing in his heart but instead wondered, 'why we are here in this world and what is the purpose of life?'

One day when he was 17 years old, he left school hungry and went to buy himself a sandwich. It was wrapped in paper which he looked at curiously...it was a page from the Bible. The man who sold the sandwich was an old Communist who invited him to his house for a coffee. Hamit went to his home, and the man started to speak against the faith. When Hamit asked to use the toilet, he found that instead of toilet paper, the man had placed the Bible. The boy felt scared to use the Bible and hid it under his clothes, so the man wouldn't notice.

When Hamit began to read the Bible, he began to understand that God loves him. John 3:16 became his favourite verse. He decided to believe this love and take it into his heart. He began to search for other people who could believe the same as the Bible. He found a church where the pastor there led him in a prayer. Hamit beams:

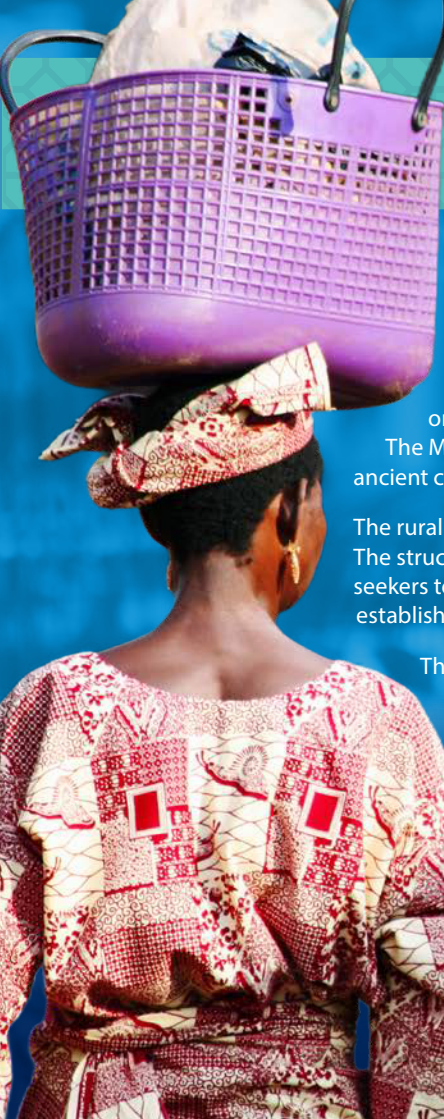

DAY 7 • MARCH 6

the **DENDI** of **NORTHERN BENIN**

Benin in West Africa is not a Muslim country, but the Dendi in the north of the country are 99.93 % Muslim. They number about 310,000 people. Among them are only very few Christians. There is no church where Dendi is spoken.

Most Dendi follow a form of folk Islam, mixing elements of orthodox Islam with their traditional rites and religious practices.

The Marabouts, religious teachers or holy men, teach Islam as well as ancient customs and are healers and contact persons to the spirit world.

The rural steppe areas of Northern Benin are home for most Dendi.

The structures of families and villages are very fundamental for their life in this region, making it unthinkable for seekers to break out of this system in order to follow Christ. That's why finding ways to spread the Gospel and establish fellowships of believers within these structures is so important.

The New Testament and some audio and video materials are available in the Dendi language, but most are unaware of their availability. In the summer of 2024, 140 evangelists swarmed the city of Djougou, where tens of thousands of Dendi live. With many of them from neighbouring people groups, they worked in different quarters of the city every day for three weeks. They wanted to find houses of peace, preach Christ to the people there and leave one of 2,000 SD-cards with audio files of Biblical books.

HOW CAN WE **PRAY?**

- *That the distributed SD-cards will be listened to again and again and would cause people to believe in the Messiah.*
- *That the Dendi would see that Jesus has power over the spirit world.*
- *That a discipleship movement would emerge by at least 1,000 Dendi being baptised and 100 house churches being established.*

SANDZAK of the BALKANS

Hamza is sitting in one of the most famous *ćevapi* restaurants in the Serbian city of Novi Pazar with his foreign friend. People come here to drink coffee and to enjoy the best sausages and a good view of the pedestrian zone. Hamza, however, is here to learn from the Bible. On their mobile phones they read John 8:32 together: "You will know the truth and the truth will set you free."

After a moment of silence, Hamza says: "That is what my people need. They should recognize Jesus as truth and as light. And then he will free them from the many dark powers and the slavery of money." And he continues: "God sent you here for me! Without you, I would no longer follow Jesus."

As the only known follower of Jesus in the entire region with around 250,000 Muslim residents, Hamza knows life in Sandzak. It is not easy for him to live his faith, but he always draws strength from the Bible. The Muslims in Sandzak are a significant majority locally, but overall, they are a minority in Serbia and Montenegro. Thirty years after the war, they are still discriminated against. This is one of the reasons why many Muslims here are very religious and devout. In the city of Novi Pazar alone, there are over 60 mosques, three Koran schools and an Islamic university for future religious teachers and imams.

The wonderful thing about praying is that you leave a world of not being able to do something, and enter God's realm where everything is possible. He specializes in the impossible.

DAY 9 • MARCH 8

COMOROS ARCHIPELAGO

Because vanilla, cloves and spices grow here, the Comoros archipelago is also known as the *Perfume Islands*, with frangipani, jasmine and lemon grass also lending a delightful fragrance. Almost one million people live on the four main islands, which are located between Madagascar and Mozambique. One of them, Mayotte, is a French overseas territory, which is why many Comorians try to reach France via this island. This has led to unrest and conflict. The population lives in poor conditions and is almost exclusively Muslim.

Said is one of the only Christians on the island. Only a few people around him and in his family know Jesus. He wants the Comoros people to get to have the opportunity to read the Word of God and to believe. Together with other believers and missionary societies, he is working on a Bible translation in the local language. This will give people access to the Word of God in their mother tongue, which is crucial to spreading the gospel and enabling a deeper connection to faith.

The unity and dedication behind this collaboration is impressive. The indigenous believers and mission agencies bring their resources, talents and passions to serve God's mission together.

the AIMAQS of AFGHANISTAN



Zai was transfixed by verses from the Gospels shared with him by a Christian worker. Tears came to his eyes as they read John 1:12 together: “Sometimes when I read this book I get goosebumps!” he said. Zai sensed God calling him to repent and surrender his life to Jesus, but he was serious about counting the cost. He also struggled to know if he understood the gospel well enough. He said that sometimes at night, he sensed God’s presence so strongly that it almost scared him, not understanding what God wanted from him.

Zai is Aimaq and his people live in the central and western highlands of Afghanistan. Numbering half a million, they live a full or semi-nomadic lifestyle. Their language is considered ‘lost’ so they speak Dari or Pashto, depending on their location.

Zai’s friend told him to speak to God and ask for faith. Reading together Revelation 3:20, he showed him that Jesus was patiently and lovingly knocking on the door of his heart and desiring a personal relationship with him. Zai was deeply moved and asked, “What must I do?” The two men reviewed the verses in Romans regarding the human condition and Romans 10:9-10 which describe a sinner’s response. Zai pondered and asked, “Is it ok if I just take tonight to think about it?” Zai later confessed that “I was afraid if I waited, Jesus might stop knocking.” Soon after this, God gave Zai a dream and he woke up knowing that he was ready to surrender his life to Christ.

HOW CAN WE PRAY?

- *Pray for the good news to be shared in the Aimaq area; the regions where they live have no gospel witness.*
- *Pray for the Aimaqs to find hope and to know the Lord as their great provider as they live in one of the poorest areas of Afghanistan.*
- *Pray that young Aimaq men would find the gospel as they travel to other places for work.*

DAY 11 • MARCH 10
LIBYA

Libya is a country rich in natural resources but devastated by civil war and various armed conflicts. These have caused massive emigration as well as economic hardship and suffering for those remaining in country. There is also spiritual hardship in that deciding to follow Christ in this strict Muslim country carries with it the threat of being punished with death.

Aatiq is one of those who has received a legally disputed death sentence. He came to know Christ through reading the Word some years ago and then wandered away from his faith. A sub-Saharan believer met him and prayed that he would have a vision of the risen Christ. A few days later he had that vision and since then has clung to the Lord in the midst of adversity caused by the boldness of his proclamation. He, somewhat like Joseph in Genesis, has been esteemed by some of those in charge of the prison because of his helpful attitude and good work.

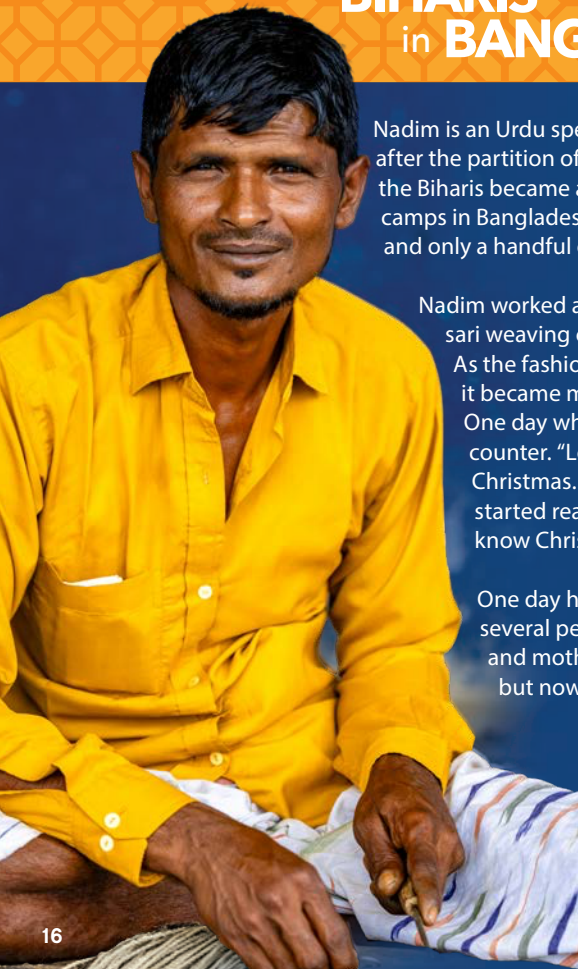
HOW CAN WE **PRAY?**

- *“Remember those in prison, as if you were there yourself. Remember also those being mistreated, as if you felt their pain in your own bodies” (Heb 13:3 NLT). Ask God that those suffering in prison be released.*
- *Pray for media outreach efforts in Libyan Arabic that programs would draw people to Christ and would also comfort and disciple secret believers.*
- *Pray that Libyans who have emigrated to other countries would find Christ and return to share with their own people.*

BIHARIS in BANGLADESH



Nadim is an Urdu speaking Bihari whose forefathers came to Dhaka after the partition of India. Caught up in the events of political changes, the Biharis became an impoverished minority people group living in camps in Bangladesh. They are considered an unreached people group and only a handful of believers exist among them.

Nadim worked as a sari designer making patterns for the silk sari weaving cottage-industry that his people are famous for.

As the fashion for wedding saris shifted from silk to other types, it became more and more difficult for him to feed his family.

One day while he was minding a friend's shop, the owner came in and threw a couple of books on the counter. "Look here," he said "the Christians are distributing their book for free on the street because of Christmas. I will try to make some money by selling them here." Nadim took a New Testament home and started reading that night. From then on, he read every night. The more he read, the more his desire to know Christ grew.

One day he met a young evangelist who lived in that area. They started talking and, with the input of several people, Nadim heard the gospel clearly explained. After embracing Jesus as his Saviour, his wife and mother-in-law came to faith as well. Nadim has learned the path of repentance in the years since but now leads a small church in his home.

HOW CAN WE PRAY?

- *That Biharis who experience persecution and rejection would find their identity in Christ.*
- *For improved conditions for the hundreds of thousands of Biharis who live in camps in squalid conditions and for them to discover Jesus as their True Hope.*
- *For educational opportunities for Bihari young people.*

DAY 13 • MARCH 12

MUSLIMS in THAILAND

James relaxed in his airplane seat, relieved to be heading off to a Christian conference and a few days of rest. As he thought about the week ahead, he felt God say to him: "Tell the lady sitting next to you that I know her and love her."

James glanced over at the young hijab-wearing Muslim lady, unsure at how to strike up a conversation. Culturally, it would be awkward for him as a man to start chatting with her. But he did it anyway.

"Asalaam alaikum", he greeted her. "Sorry to bother you, but I am a Christian, and a few minutes ago, I felt God wanted to tell you that He sees you and knows you. And that He loves you, too."

Saripa's eyes opened wide, as she stuttered back: "You're a Christian!?! I have just been reading the Bible. Can you help explain it to me?"

"Yes, of course", James said in shock, as he marvelled at God's ways. "But where do you live? Maybe my wife can meet with you to explain more." She proceeded to tell James that she lived in the exact city he was working in. And then they realized that they lived in the same neighbourhood, and, in fact, on the very same street! God was indeed at work in their family and bringing a hunger for His Word.

Later that week, James' wife reached out to Saripa and the two began a study of Scripture that only God himself could have orchestrated.

HOW CAN WE PRAY?

- *Pray for Thai Muslims who have an interest in Jesus but struggle to learn more. Pray for Christian friends who can explain the Good News.*
- *Pray for the growth of the small churches in the Muslim areas of Thailand.*
- *As Jesus prayed in Matthew 9, ask God to send more workers to reap the harvest to come.*

AZERBAIJAN

About six years ago, Yusif had back surgery. The recovery was long and painful, and he was confined to bed.

As he lay in bed in Guba, a city in northern Azerbaijan, he thought a lot about his life. He had grown up in a Muslim culture, but he began to question it. As he was searching for truth, he found the New Testament on the internet and started reading it. A great comfort, joy and peace came to his heart. He had never known such joy and comfort. He begged the God of the Bible:

*“Heal me so that I may stand up and dedicate my whole life to You.
I will learn about You and believe in You.”*

And God healed him. Yusif got out of bed and was able to work again.

One day, he came across social media content from Azerbaijani believers. Because he had loved reading the New Testament online, he wanted a physical copy to read as well.

He connected with the believers via social media and requested one. When Kamil visited and presented him with a New Testament, Yusif told him, “I already believe in Jesus Christ.”

Right then and there—in the middle of the street—Kamil led Yusif in a prayer of repentance, and he accepted Jesus Christ as his Lord. Soon, his family began to follow Jesus, and now they faithfully attend a small church in their region.

DAY 14



DAY 15 • MARCH 14
the **SHABAKS**
of **IRAQ**

The Shabaks are a minority ethnic group living mostly on the so-called Nineveh Plains, east of Mosul. Numbering around half a million, they've often suffered from oppression and neglect. Most Shabaks follow Shia Islam, with a minority being Sunni Muslims. A small number have come to know God as their loving father who rejoices in repentant sinners.

There is currently no Scripture available in Shabaki but a team is working on translating the Gospel of Luke into their language. Salim, an older Shabak man, helps with testing translated Bible chapters for comprehension.

When he was given Luke 15 to read, Salim was sure he had identified the turning point in the parable of the prodigal son, understanding it to say: "While he was still a long way off, he saw his father, ran to him, threw his arms around him and kissed him. In Salim's world, this was the only way to interpret the passage as the God he knows wouldn't run to reach the lost. The parable was just as confusing to him as it must have been to the original audience that Jesus spoke to!

The team clarified that no, the passage was about God the Father running towards the sinner. A few weeks later, Salim started meeting and praying with a believer.

HOW CAN WE **PRAY?**

- *For the ongoing translation process and the scheduled release of the Gospel of Luke in the near future.*
- *Many Shabaks to read, hear, and listen to the Good News in their heart language.*
- *For God's kingdom to take root in the Nineveh Plains.*



DAY 16 • MARCH 15

JIHADISTS in BURKINA FASO

It was market day in a small village in eastern Burkina Faso. Suddenly jihadists came and began threatening the people. A young Christian had positioned his small radio on the market well, with a broadcast about Jesus in Fulfulde. In his panic, he forgot to switch it off.

One of the terrorists came to the well and started listening. "Whose radio is this?" he asked. After a long time of silence, an older man said: "It belongs to this young man." The jihadist kept listening to the message, while his comrades kept threatening the villagers. Finally, he took the radio without any more words.

After a week, the terrorists came to the market again – including the one who had taken the radio. He looked for the young owner of the radio, and when he couldn't find him, addressed the old man who had pointed out the young man a week ago. "The message in the radio was very good! Where can I find a second one?"

The jihadists need the Good News, too. But who will bring it to them? According to a 2022 report by the United Nations Development Program, poverty and unemployment, and not religious conviction, are the main reasons that people in Africa join extremist groups. Christians allow fear to prevent them from praying for terrorists as well as investigating solutions for the material needs that drive people into extremism.

UZBEKISTAN

Some years ago, Gulnora visited an Uzbek village.

“The mullah proudly showed me the new mosque and probably expected criticism from me as a Christian. But I praised the mosque and said that I hoped that God’s word would be preached there. He was surprised, and when I gave him a copy of the New Testament in Uzbek he took it, touched it with his lips and forehead and finally held it close to his heart. A group of men had gathered around us and when they saw how the mullah received the New Testament with such honour, they also wanted books, but unfortunately I did not have any more with me.”

“Recently I travelled back to the same village,” she said. “The mullah had heard about my arrival and came towards me on the road. While still far off, he called out: “My daughter! You’ve returned at last! Do you remember that when you were here last time you gave me the New Testament in Uzbek? I am so grateful to you! Now I know every Friday what to read in our mosque, and I have a holy book which shows the way to God in my language. The other books that I have I could not understand, but this one helps me to prepare my sermons and give hope to those who listen!”

DAY 18 • MARCH 17

the **WESTERN CHAM** of **CAMBODIA**

The Western Cham are a Muslim people group with their own language who have lived in Buddhist majority Cambodia since the 17th century.

Traditionally fishermen and farmers, they were severely persecuted under the Pol Pot regime, with more than a third of their population massacred in the 1970s. They now number about 600,000.

Mei is an elderly Cham woman in her eighties who lives in a small village about 3 hours from Phnom Penh with her children, grandchildren and great-grandchildren. The gift of a New Testament in her own language on a small audio player fed Mei's curiosity about the gospel and she began working through the Bible narratives with two believers who visit her village regularly. Then, one night Mei had a vivid dream about Jesus judging the people of the earth, sending them to heaven and hell. This convinced her that He was the way the truth and the life.

Today she is eager to share her faith whenever she meets family and friends. Two daughters and two great granddaughters regularly join with her and the two believing visitors to pray, eat and study stories from the scripture. The meetings are open for others to join. Sometimes one of their husbands joins them. Recently around ten more people were baptised so the small community of faith is growing.

DAY 19 • MARCH 18

ASYLUM SEEKERS of EUROPE



Hussain grew up as the only child of a moderately Muslim couple, but within a fundamentalist Islamic regime. In his mid 20s, Hussain worked in a fitness centre where one of his workmates was a follower of Jesus. One day, they had a discussion about the Bible and, as a parting gift before moving to another city, his colleague gave Hussain a copy of the New Testament in his own language.

Hussain read the Scriptures from cover to cover and had many questions. However, there was no-one with whom he could safely talk. Even so, as he read, he experienced the presence and peace of God, and became convinced that Jesus' words are life and truth. Although supportive of their son's new beliefs, his parents warned him to keep them to himself. And so Hussain remained alone as a believer for the next five years.

During that time, the Islamic regime became more and more repressive. Hussain knew that if he stayed, eventually he would be caught and killed, and so he decided to run to a safe European country, where he finally met other Christians and was baptised.

Two years have passed and Hussain is still fighting for refugee status in his adopted country. He works hard to learn the language, and dreams of going to university to become an engineer. However, there is still a chance he might be rejected and deported to his homeland, where he would almost certainly be imprisoned.

HOW CAN WE PRAY?

- *For Christian refugees from a Muslim background who, like Hussain, are in danger of being deported by their host countries.*
- *For boldness among Christians in Muslim countries to discuss the Bible with their Muslim friends and distribute it wisely.*
- *For revelation for Muslim seekers as they read God's word, and for access to the people and resources to help them on their faith journey.*

DAY 20 • MARCH 19

the MINANGKABAU in INDONESIA

There is a famous Minang poem that concludes with the line: alam takambang jadikan guru (nature becomes the teacher). Zul, who grew up and still lives in the rural heartland of the Minangkabau people, would have heard this poem. The 'nature' he was taught to conform to is a complex interplay of the natural world, social expectations and traditional and religious obligations.

Although religious tradition is strong, education is also highly prized, particularly by Zul's father who taught Zul to search for knowledge wherever he found it. Zul has, therefore, been bold enough to look beyond his culture and reach out for a copy of the Bible. He has read it, from cover to cover, and warmly received believers who visited him and answered his questions. Now he is sharing this treasure with others.

Sadly, this sort of receptiveness is not common. Minangkabau are one of the most strongly Muslim people groups in Indonesia and opportunities for them to hear or read the Word of God have been limited. Furthermore, most fear the Bible - having been taught that it is dangerous.

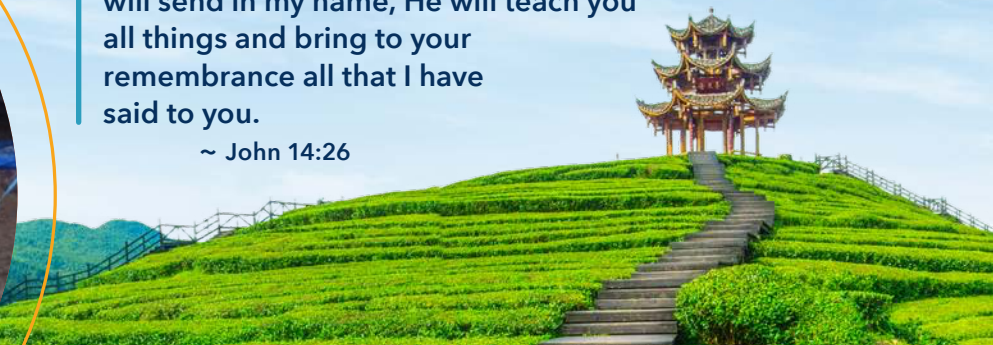

the **SARAIKI** of **PAKISTAN**

Shakir is one of 26 million Saraiki speakers who live in the Southern Punjab in Pakistan. The area is predominantly rural and poor, despite providing much of the country's wheat, cotton, sugar cane and mangoes. In recent years, flooding has devastated some areas, pushing people into greater poverty.

The Southern Punjab is proud of its ancient history and its beautiful handicrafts, mystic poetry and the many shrines dedicated to Sufi saints. Festivals held around these saints bring thousands of people who daily come in search of physical or mental healing, solutions for personal and financial problems and other life challenges. People are desperately seeking for a power that can bring meaning and transformation to their lives.

Shakir was one of those people: "I was very religious from a young age," he says, "following all the Islamic practices strictly. I used to hate non-Muslims, especially Christians. One day, I had a dream telling me to stop the hatred. After that, I started seeking friends outside my faith. Social media exposed me to Jesus Christ's teachings, which touched my heart deeply and a brother I met through Facebook began teaching me about Him. This led me to read the New Testament, especially the Gospel of John, which strengthened my faith. Eventually, I received a complete Bible and continued to grow in my faith. I accepted Jesus Christ sincerely, knowing humanly speaking this would bring me difficulties. Please pray for me to be strong in this new Christian journey and for my family to come to know Christ."

PALESTINIANS in JORDAN

Eve, one of the many Palestinian living in Jordan, came to our clinic with back pain. Amongst the many desperate and demanding people, she had a kind and sincere heart.

Eve desires to please God and know the holy books so she goes to Qur'an classes each week at her local mosque. We invited her to a woman's exercise class and quickly decided to train her to become the class coach.

As we visited each week, she poured out her heart. The gossip and suspicion between extended family members, living in the same building. Her husband's debt. The deep pain caused by the rejection from her stepsons. Her husband didn't want to get involved. She ached for peace.

We longed to read the Bible with her and she agreed! She drank in the prophet stories of the Old Testament. 'Do Christians still have to offer sacrifices, like Abraham and Moses did?' We replied, 'Wait and see'.

Week by week, she asked her question. Finally, we said, 'We do have a sacrifice, but it is very expensive.' Curious, she mused, 'Expensive? Maybe a camel?' We got to Isaiah 53. 'This is about Jesus isn't it? He's the sacrifice.' She paused. 'But is he the sacrifice for ALL people?' We replied excitedly, 'Yes, for ALL people who trust in Him!' She looked flat. 'I do believe Jesus is a prophet, but the Qur'an says he didn't die.' We weren't surprised, though were disappointed. 'But I'd still like to keep reading with you.' The Word of God has captured Eve's heart, but Islam blinds her.

DAY 23 • MARCH 22
DAGESTAN

For the Son of Man came to seek and to save the lost.

Kamiila was born into a large Muslim family in Dagestan, a mountainous region that has traditionally been one of the least-receptive places to the gospel. Even as a young girl she was headstrong and independent, refusing to do her namaz (Muslim prayers). Her father told her that Allah would severely punish those who disobeyed him. This caused Kamiila to question if God was really like her father. *“If he is like that, then I don’t want to believe in such a God!”*, she thought.

When Kamiila was 12 years old, she saw a woman sitting on the seashore reading a book so she approached her and asked, “What is the name of the book you are reading?” The woman answered: “The Bible.” That stirred something in Kamiila’s heart, and from that moment on, she desired to have a copy of her very own.

Kamiila grew up, married, and had three children. Yet she never stopped searching for truth. Her husband let her decide whether she wanted to show her devotion to Allah by covering her head but Kamiila was tormented by whether Allah required it. At that moment, she cried out: *“God, I don’t know who you are! If you hear me, show yourself to me just once, and I won’t ask you for anything else!”*

That night, a tall man in white clothes appeared to Kamiila in a dream. He didn’t have to identify Himself. She immediately recognised Him as Jesus, and in His presence, she felt as light as a feather. She woke up and began to look again for a Bible. Three weeks later, she was sitting in a church with tears flowing down her cheeks as she held the book that she had dreamt of having for decades.

HOW CAN WE **PRAY?**

- *That seekers like Kamiila would have access to Scriptures in their language.*
- *For protection on the believers and the small house churches.*
- *For a radiant Dagestani church to reach out to other Caucasian peoples.*

DAY 24 • MARCH 23

the **OROMO** in **ETHIOPIA**

Ahmed has only recently started travelling with Jesus. He lives in a small village, far away from any major city. His half-brother lives abroad and visits the family every year. He always told them about Jesus. For a long time, Ahmed had little interest in this. Nevertheless, he listened patiently. Then one sentence stuck in his head: "God loves you!" Ahmed then read the New Testament on his mobile phone and wanted to know more.

As there were no followers of Jesus in his village, Ahmed travelled to the city. There he met a pastor who took time for him. After a long time, Ahmed entrusted his life to Jesus and was baptised. However, his life did not become easier, but more difficult. When it became known that he no longer went to the mosque, he was questioned by the village elders. Even his friends no longer want to be with him, as they now see him as an unbeliever. Many Oromo who follow Jesus feel the same way as Ahmed.

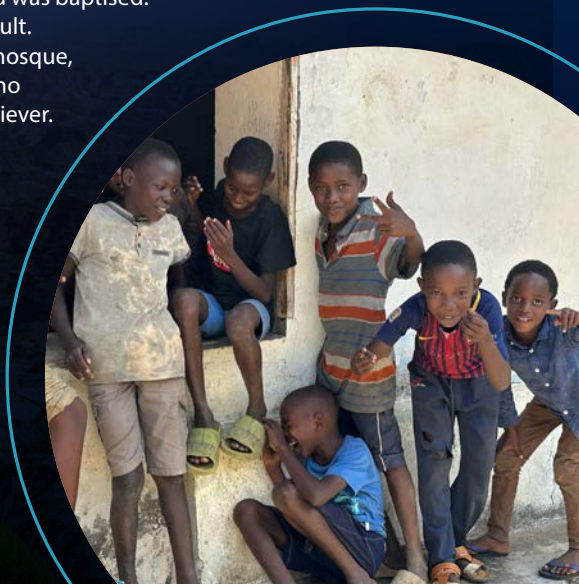
At around 45 million, the Oromo are the largest ethnic group in Ethiopia. They were oppressed for a long time. Great hopes were raised when Abiy Ahmed, an Oromo, became Prime Minister of Ethiopia. But even he was unable to halt the country's decline. In many areas of Oromia, there are no churches that new followers of Jesus could join. Persecution and social ostracism await Muslims who want to follow Jesus.

DAY 25 • MARCH 24

DUNGANS of CENTRAL ASIA

Daniel, whose good friend Makhmud was a math teacher at the local school, lived in a village in Kyrgyzstan which is mainly inhabited by Dungans, Chinese Muslims who refer to themselves in China as the Hui. The Dungans fled Northwest China for Central Asia in the late 19th century after the failure of their revolt against the Qing dynasty. They are a very closed community; there are only a few people who have accepted Jesus as their Lord.

Daniel and Makhmud met for a while to read the Bible. Sadly, Daniel died of a heart attack last year, but he left a good mark and memories in this village. When the village community came together a year after the funeral to remember Daniel, as is traditional in Muslim societies, Makhmud was one of the people who spoke. He told the other villagers about the Bible study with Daniel and how it had shaped him. And then he called on devout Muslims to read the Bible if they want to better understand what they don't understand in the Qur'an.

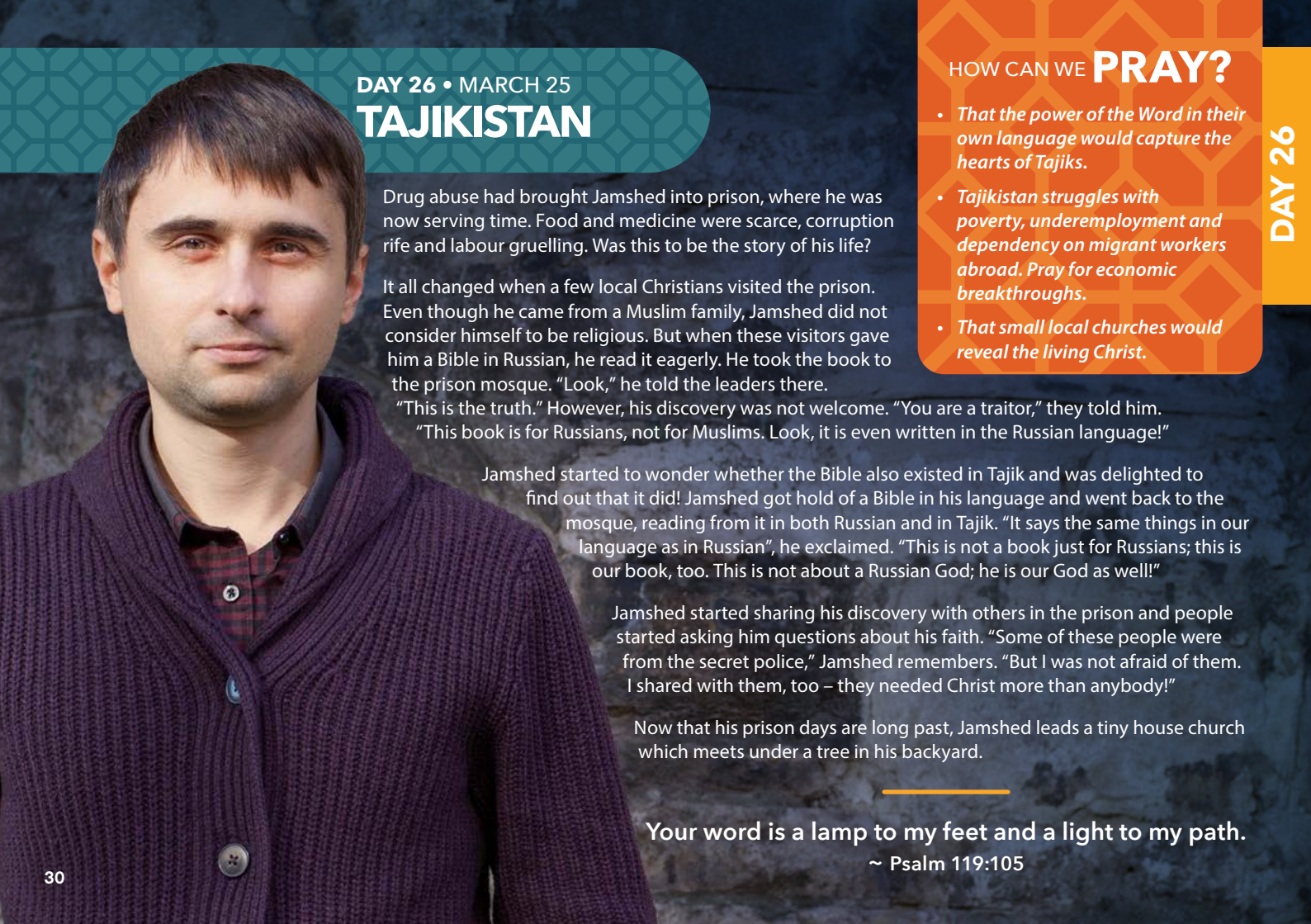

Drug abuse had brought Jamshed into prison, where he was now serving time. Food and medicine were scarce, corruption rife and labour gruelling. Was this to be the story of his life?

It all changed when a few local Christians visited the prison. Even though he came from a Muslim family, Jamshed did not consider himself to be religious. But when these visitors gave him a Bible in Russian, he read it eagerly. He took the book to the prison mosque. "Look," he told the leaders there.

"This is the truth." However, his discovery was not welcome. "You are a traitor," they told him.

"This book is for Russians, not for Muslims. Look, it is even written in the Russian language!"

Jamshed started to wonder whether the Bible also existed in Tajik and was delighted to find out that it did! Jamshed got hold of a Bible in his language and went back to the mosque, reading from it in both Russian and in Tajik. "It says the same things in our language as in Russian", he exclaimed. "This is not a book just for Russians; this is our book, too. This is not about a Russian God; he is our God as well!"

Jamshed started sharing his discovery with others in the prison and people started asking him questions about his faith. "Some of these people were from the secret police," Jamshed remembers. "But I was not afraid of them. I shared with them, too – they needed Christ more than anybody!"

Now that his prison days are long past, Jamshed leads a tiny house church which meets under a tree in his backyard.

HOW CAN WE **PRAY?**

- *That the power of the Word in their own language would capture the hearts of Tajiks.*
- *Tajikistan struggles with poverty, underemployment and dependency on migrant workers abroad. Pray for economic breakthroughs.*
- *That small local churches would reveal the living Christ.*

DAY 27 • MARCH 26

NIGHT of POWER

A few years ago, on a previous Night of Power, two believers in Turkey were walking and praying along the seafront in Istanbul, asking God to speak to Turkish Muslims that night. Ahead, they overheard an agitated couple having a video phone conversation with one of their mothers: "No, *anne [mother]*, still no baby. But tonight is the Night of Power and we will be praying all night for a miracle."

Laylat al-Qadr, the 'Night of Power' or 'Night of Destiny', is one of the most sacred events in the Islamic calendar. Believed to be the night when the Qur'an was sent into the world and its first verses revealed to Muhammad, Muslims believe that prayers and good deeds done on this night are of greater value than those done in a thousand months. Some trust in the words of Muhammad when he said: "Whoever stands [in prayer] during the Night of Power out of belief and seeking reward, his previous sins are forgiven." (Sahih al-Bukhari 1901) Many Muslims spend the night praying for forgiveness of sins and reciting the Qur'an.

The exact night of Laylat al-Qadr is debated by Islamic scholars, as it is believed to occur on any of the odd numbered days in the last ten days of Ramadan. In order to be found faithful on the actual night, some Muslims will observe *i'tikaf* (seclusion) during the last ten days in order to focus on reflection, prayer and to avoid involvement in worldly affairs.

HOW CAN WE PRAY?

- For Muslims to have miraculous encounters with Jesus while praying during the Night of Power. (John 20:30-31)
- For Muslims to have a revelation of the forgiveness offered through Jesus. (Titus 3:5)
- For Christian workers to have the opportunity to pray in Jesus' name for their Muslim friends.



DAY 28 • MARCH 27

IRANIANS in NORTHERN IRELAND

Maura has been meeting with her Iranian friend, Soheyla, to study God's Word and she has been thrilled to witness how the Spirit has been revealing truth to her. Soheyla said that before she left Iran, she thought she had everything she needed: a good job; a lovely house; a car and plenty of food. But now she notes that "God has brought me here and now I realise that none of these things matter. Now I have none of these things, but I have met Jesus and He has shown me what really matters is knowing Him and my family."

Maura and Soheyla have been journeying through Matthew and identifying with the questions of the disciples: 'Who is this man? Even the wind and waves obey Him.' (Matt 9:27) through to the disciples' recognition, 'You really are the Son of God' (Matt 14:33). At this point Soheyla began to cry as she said with all her heart, "This is really important. The people of Iran need to know this. Jesus really is the Son of God."

Every time the friends meet, Soheyla will speak out a Truth without realising it. One time she said, "Jesus is like a light, like a candle. He dispels all the darkness around us and he helps you to see the way forward one step at a time. We don't need to see too far ahead, for He is with us." When Maura showed her John 8:12 and Psalm 119:105, tears flowed down Soheyla's cheeks. It's a beautiful thing to see the Spirit at work.

DAY 29 • MARCH 28

HADJARAI of the SAHEL

The ethnic groups of the Guéra region of Chad are called “Hadjarai”, which means “people of the mountains”. More than 550,000 Hadjarai, who speak 25 different languages, live in this hilly area in the centre of the country. The climate is dry and hot, with a rainy season from June to September. There is significant poverty, with most people in the villages living from agriculture and livestock farming.

The majority of the population in the Guéra region is Muslim, though traditional African religions are also practiced. In almost every ethnic group, however, there are also up to approximately 5% Christians, and two language groups (Kenga and Guergiko) are comprised of around 30% Christians.

None of the Hadjarai languages have a complete Bible, though four have a New Testament with a fifth, Dadjo, becoming available this year. Because more than half their population have not learned to read and write, literacy work has been important, as well as creative ways to share the gospel through the creative arts.

Sharon rehearsed a theatre play with a group of Chadians about the death and resurrection of Jesus. It was performed on Good Friday in a large square in Mongo, a major city in the Hadjarai region.

Around 200 adults and children watched, crowding close to the actors to see what happened to Jesus. A Muslim who was filming the crucifixion scene asked a friend next to him if Jesus Christ was really whipped and nailed like that. His friend didn't know, so he said he wanted to get to the bottom of it. Two Muslim women found the torture of Jesus very moving. One said she could hardly believe it and wanted to know more.

- *For peace and stability in Chad.*

MIRACLE in GAZA

The Word became flesh and made His dwelling among us. We have seen His glory, the glory of the one and only Son, who came from the Father, full of grace and truth. ~ John 1:14

Rasim, his wife Yasmin, and their five children were asleep in their home in Gaza when the bombing began. The night sky lit up with explosions. Suddenly, their home was struck and collapsed upon them. The family was buried under heaps of concrete and debris. Darkness enveloped them, and the air was thick with dust.

Despite being trapped under the rubble, they found that there was a little space around them which allowed them to breathe. The children's desperate sobbing and fear drove Yasmin to pray for a miracle. But the endless minutes turned into hours. Time seemed unending and dark. Five days and five nights went by.

Finally, they heard noises. Beams of light pierced through the darkness; rescuers slowly and carefully cleared the way. Hands pulled Rasim, Yasmin, and their children out - one by one - covered in dust, with bruises and scratches, but alive. Everybody was in awe. How could they be still alive after such a long time under the ruins?

Yasmin beamed with grateful tears in her eyes, when she shared their miraculous story. "A man in a shining white gown came a few times to us and brought water and food. I asked him for his name, and the stranger replied: "I am Isa, al Masih!" The family had been devout Muslims and had never before been in contact with any Christians. But now, together with others in Gaza, they have found the truth.

HOW CAN WE **PRAY?**

- *For peace in Israel between Palestinians and Israelis.*
- *For the traumatized people in Gaza: that they will be comforted.*
- *For peaceful political solutions that bring an end to war and terror.*

WHAT SHOULD WE DO NOW?

Greet Muslims you may encounter right after the fast with 'Eid Mubarak!' Bring a gift of candy to a Muslim neighbour.

Ask God if there was any specific request or people group from this year that He wants you to focus on in more depth through praying, giving to Gospel outreach amongst those people – or maybe going yourself.

Invite Muslims to your home to share a meal and your family life with them – many international students say they return home never having been invited into a local home in the country where they've studied.

- Pray for those in authority in Muslim-majority nations to govern with righteousness and to pursue peace (1 Tim 2:1-7).
- Pray for Muslims you may know personally or those you encounter where you live and work.

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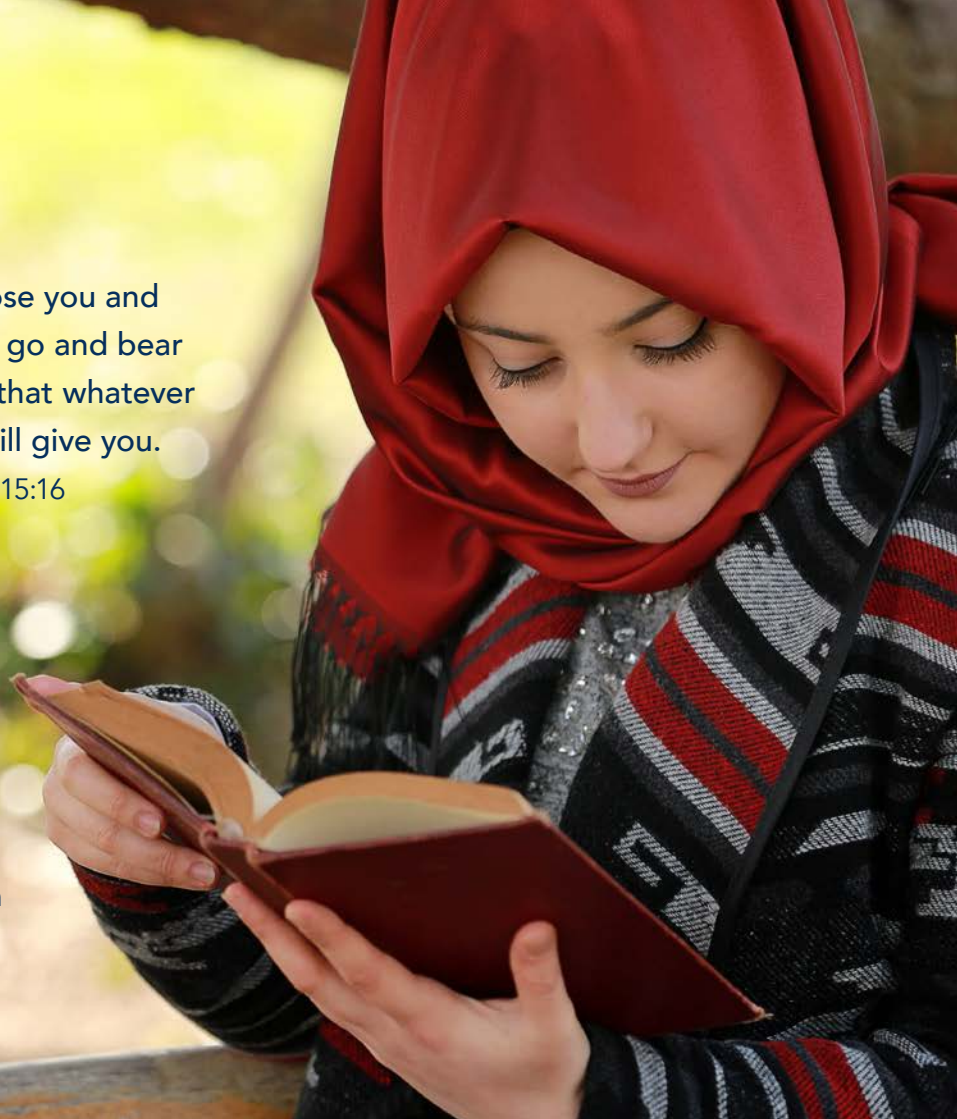
